

Year 9 Foundation Examinations 22nd to 26th January 2024

The Foundation Examinations will take place w/b 22nd January which gives Year 9 a clear fortnight after the Christmas holidays before the exams start, this will ensure all students can see each of their subject teachers at least once before their exam. A launch assembly for the Foundation Examinations will be held with Year 9 on the morning of Tuesday 9th January, during which we will explain the importance of revision. The exams will allow you and your child to see where their strengths lie in the Foundation subjects as they begin to think about their GCSE pathways choices, this process will start later in the Spring term.

The Foundation Examinations are an important indicator of progress made by students and although there will be preparation taking place in lessons, the expectation is that this is supplemented and supported with revision at home. Our Parent/Carers guide to effective revision can be found on the school website here, and it is full of ways that you can help your child to prepare for their exams. We have invested in an online revision tool called Seneca Learning; your child has the log in details for this. Please encourage them to use this along with the other sign posted revision resources on GO 4 Schools for each subject.

During the revision assembly we will explain to Year 9 how to plan the use of their time and ensure that they can fit in sufficient revision for each subject. There is help, support and guidance on the school website here covering how to revise, how to deal with stress and useful links to documents such as the topics covered by the exams, a blank revision planner and the exams timetable.

Why are we studying this?

In the Spring Term, Year 7 delves into Shakespeare's enchanting comedy, "A Midsummer Night's Dream." This whimsical play introduces students to Shakespearean language, comedic elements, and diverse characters. Their exploration is a foundational step, setting the stage for the study of "The Tempest" In Year 8. As they navigate the magical real mofthe play, students will be mastering writing effective points, choosing the best quotations and explore the effect of Shakespeare's choice of language. This early exposure not only lays the ground work for studying "The Tempest", but also serves as a bridge to the modern complexities of "Small Island" in Year 9, fostering a seamless transition from classical to contemporary literature.

In Year 9, students delve into Andrea Levy's modern masterpiece, "Small Island," developing analytical skills crucial for modern drama. "Small Island" tells the story of The Windrush Generation and follows individual characters on their journey to acceptance. They learn a nalyse dra matic conventions like stage directions and structural elements, exploring the intricacies of character language and play structure. This study serves as a springboard for their exploration of "An Inspector Calls" in Key Stage 4, fostering a seamless transition from contemporary literature to classic drama.

Year 10 'Power and Conflict' Poetry





Why are we studying this?

In Year 10, students embark on the AQA 'Power and Conflict' poetry anthology, building upon their KS3 poetry foundation. Prepped to analyse imagery and craft comparative essays exploring meaning, they now delve into the first 10 poems exploring the poetry of Tennyson, Owen, Dharker and others.

This unit will build students' core knowledge of poets, contexts and themes before supporting them in writing structured, comparative essays crucial for success in GCSE English Literature Paper 2 a component of the End of Year 10 exams.

Why are we studying this?

Year 11 will be returning to the 'Power and Conflict' anthology to complete 5 remaining poems. Next, there will be a focus on constructing brilliant essays using a range of model responses, essay plans and, of course, independent and creative thinking. Students will be completing in-class exam responses to support their preparation for the Easter Mock Exams when they tackle GCSE English Literature Paper 2.






