The pathways booklet is available on the website <u>here</u> and a hard copy will be available at the Year 9 Pathways Evening. This details the process we follow and contains lots of useful information. The school website <u>here</u> has information about each subject and the links to two websites that offer lots of useful career's advice and forward planning activities to help students decide.

Andrew Austin, the school's careers guidance officer, will be attending both the Pathways and Progress Evenings to offer further help and advice as to which subjects will allow your child to progress on to the Post 16 courses and training, they wish to pursue. They should ask teachers questions too. This, together with the upcoming grade update, and the Progress Evening (Thursday 21st March) should all help them to reach a well-considered set of options.

Please do not be daunted by this process, we will guide your son/daughter through each step offering advice, guidance, and support as required. Do start conversations at home, talking about subjects and what they hope to gain by doing them, this is an important part of the process. Please bear in mind that curriculum reforms in recent years mean that previous experiences of some practical based courses may be out of date, the emphasis is now more on the theory and application of the knowledge and less so on the practical work itself. The options we offer may be subject to change as a result of the number of students who opted for each subject, staffing changes or we may choose to offer an alternative level 2 course for a subject that matches the needs of the cohort. We will of course share any changes with you at the earliest opportunity.

Year 8 Foundation Examinations

4th to 8th March 2024

The Foundation Examinations will take place w/b 4th March which allows Year 8 a clear fortnight since they returned from the half term holiday before the exams start, this will ensure all students can see each of their subject teachers at least once before their exam. A launch assembly for the Foundation Examinations was held with Year 8 on the morning of Monday 19th February, during which we explained the importance of revision. The exams will allow you and your child to see where their strengths lie in the Foundation subjects and show them their areas for development.

The Foundation Examinations are an important indicator of progress made by students and although there will be preparation taking place in lessons, the expectation is that this is supplemented and supported with revision at home. Our Parent/Carers guide to effective revision can be found on the school website <u>here</u>, and it is full of ways that you can help your child to prepare for their exams. We have invested in an online revision tool called Seneca Learning; your child has the log in details for this. Please encourage them to use this along with the other signposted revision resources on GO 4 Schools for each subject.

During the revision assembly we explained to Year 8 how to plan the use of their time and ensure that they can fit in sufficient revision for each subject. There is help, support and guidance on the school website <u>here</u> covering how to revise, how to deal with stress and useful links to documents such as the topics covered by the exams, a blank revision planner and the exams timetable. All of these details were shared with Year 8 in an email, which contained links to the key documents they need to get started with their revision.

The Revision Revolution

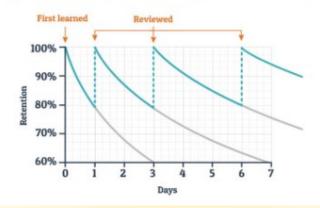
As we move towards 'exam season' we will be sharing a series of articles to inform you of the importance of revision and share with you some of the most effective revision strategies that you and your child can use as they prepare for their exams. The Science of Learning

In recent years, there has been lots of research around the science of learning and how we learn and retain information.

In summary, what do we know about memory?

Typical Forgetting Curve for Newly Learned Information



Forgetting is completely natural. Research has shown that over time you forget a majority of what you've learnt, and it happens immediately.

Information, if not revisited, is 'lost' from our memory.

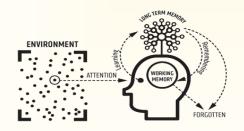
Consistent practice and revisiting previous material strengthen memory and boosts learning. Our working memory is finite and limited and so overloading this or cramming for revision doesn't work.

Essentially, with memory, it's use it or lose it!

We know examinations place huge cognitive demands on pupils and require the retrieval of large bodies of knowledge from long-term memory.

But, according to the cognitive psychologist, Dan Willingham, more progress has been made in our understanding of cognitive science in the last five years than in the previous two and half thousand years.

That means, after lots of research, we now have an evidence-informed understanding of the most effective revision strategies. These strategies will strengthen memory and improve retrieval (very helpful in exams).



Knowledge Organisers

Knowledge organisers contain a summary of the facts and key knowledge of a topic which can be used for memorising, testing, and reviewing knowledge.

You can find subject/topic knowledge organisers on the <u>Curriculum subject</u> page of the school website.

Use the 20-minute Knowledge Organisers plan:

Spend **3 minutes** reading and re-reading the section of the knowledge organiser. Spend **2 minutes** trying to recall the information in your head or say it out loud. You

- could ask yourself 'how' and 'why' questions. This is called **'Elaboration'.**
- Put your KO away and write out the topic and answers relevant to the information spend about **10 minutes** on your Qs and & As.
- Spend the last **5 minutes** checking your answers by looking again at the knowledge organiser and writing any corrections in a green pen.



1. Memorise it.	Read a section of your knowledge organisers. Repeat to yourself from memory until you think you have got it right.	
2. Cover it up.	Put your knowledge organiser away so you cannot copy it. This will mean that your brain will have to work harder, meaning it is more likely to stay in your long-term memory.	
3. Write it down.	Get a blank sheet/notebook and write out what you can remember. Even if you are finding it difficult, do not look back at your knowledge organiser but think hard and challenge yourself to recall. You can date it and compare with other attempts in the future.	
4. Check it.	Check it. Refer to your knowledge organisers and check your work against it.	
5. Correct it.	Make corrections using a green pen and continue this process until you can recall the information.	

Barbara Wylie: A Beacon of Inspiration in Women's History



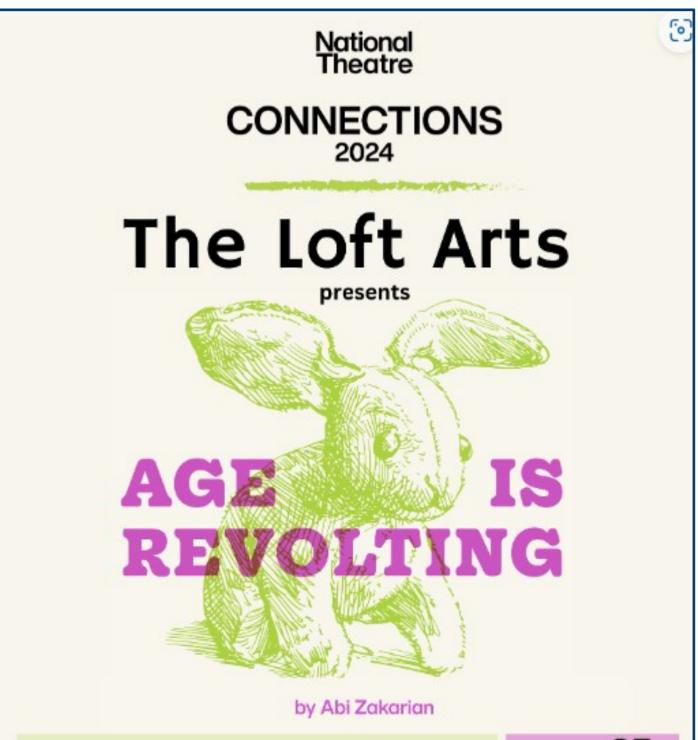

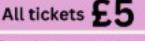
