

Online Learning -

Update

The number of MS Teams video sessions delivered this week has increased to 60, which is a 50% increase on the previous week and we hope that this number will continue to increase during the last 2 weeks of term. Many thanks to those of you who have found the time to read the Student and Parent acceptable use guidance and provided permission for your child(ren) to participate in MS Teams video sessions using the online form. We understand that you may be busy trying to juggle working in new ways, home schooling and the many other daily tasks we all have to carry out to keep our homes running smoothly. However it is essential that all Parents/Carers complete this agreement, which can be found by clicking on this <u>link</u>. Unfortunately, we will be unable to provide access to MS Teams video sessions for those students we have not received Parent/Carer consent for after Friday 10th July.

We have received a number of questions via the feed back section of the Student and Parent acceptable use guidance form and we thought it would be helpful to provide you all with the answers to these frequently asked questions.

MS Teams FAQs

"We do not have a web cam on our computer, can we still access the video sessions?"

The students web cams have been deactivated for the safety of all students, as has their ability to present to the class. Therefore, there is no requirement for students to have a web cam, the only requirement is that they are able to hear the Teachers voice and, where possible, see the screen the Teacher is sharing with them. This means they can access the main parts of the lesson on a smart phone if there are no other available devices.

"What will the school do if students use inappropriate language over the microphone or within the chat?"

We expect the behaviour of students to be of the highest standard in video sessions, as we would expect it to be during lessons in school. If a student's behaviour falls below these expectations they will be immediately removed from the lesson and we will then review whether they should continue to have access to the video sessions. Any inappropriate language would result in the student in question losing their access with immediate effect. All students have been sent an email to remind them of the expected behaviour and the consequences of failing to follow the acceptable use guidance and will be reminded of this at the start of lessons.

"Our broadband/WIFI signal is not of a sufficient strength to join all video sessions, what can we do to overcome this problem?"

We fully understand the issues that poor broadband coverage in some of the surrounding areas can cause, which is why we continue to provide distance learning activities on Go4Schools should students be unable to access video sessions for any reason. A way of accessing the video sessions in areas with poor broadband coverage is to switch off the incoming video feed and listen to the Teacher's audio only, this requires a lower broadband signal strength and so will allow your child to access the lesson in some form.

"We don't have a suitable device at home for accessing the video sessions, are there any devices available through the school?"

We do not have any devices available at the moment, however, we are in the final stages of setting up an agreement with a company that offers Parents/Carers the chance to lease or purchase a Chrome book device at a discounted price. We are aiming to provide you with greater detail of this scheme before the end of the Summer term so that devices can be leased or purchased in time for the start of the next academic year. Whilst we hope there won't be as greater need for video sessions in the future, there may be times when they are unavoidable and we want to be in a position to offer them as soon as the need arises. We are planning to continue to use the other features MS Teams offers well beyond these uncertain times to further enhance the learning experience of students.

"We do not have enough devices for all members of the household to access their video lessons at the same time, so they will miss some sessions, is there an alternative?"

We are setting all tasks on Go4Schools, meaning they can be accessed at another convenient time and staff can be contacted via email should students require help outside of their timetabled lessons. We are trialling recording lessons for Year 10 students who miss video lessons when they are in school, to allow them to catch up during their Friday catch up session. We hope that this will become part of what we are able to offer in the near future.

"Our house is very busy at the moment with everyone working from home, the only quiet space our children have is in their bedrooms, why can't they access video sessions in their bedroom?"

In our guidance we suggest that it is good practice not to allow students to access video sessions in their bedrooms, as there may be distractions such as mobile devices, games consoles etc, which will impact on their ability to concentrate during the sessions. Students accessing video sessions in a communal space allows parents and carers to monitor whether their child is on task, as Teachers would in the classroom, that they are accessing the internet safely and that interactions with other students are positive. There has to be an element of common sense when following this guidance. If there is no suitable alternative space available, then removing distractions until the lessons are finished and regularly checking on your child to make sure that they are on task and safe can be used at the Parent/Carer's discretion.

"Please can we have more notice of when the lessons will be taking place?"

The Teaching staff are adjusting to a very different way of teaching at a rapid pace and I am sure that as they settle into their new routine, they will be able to provide students with greater notice of upcoming video sessions. It is possible to see planned sessions on the calendar in Outlook and in the Teams app. The global calendar shows that there are a number of sessions scheduled for the final two weeks already.

We value all of your feedback and use the questions and points raised to improve the experience that students receive, so please keep letting us know how we are doing and we will do all that we can to continue to improve upon the positive start that Teachers and Students have made to this new way of teaching and learning. We will be continuing to offer the sessions set out in the video session timetable over the final two weeks of the Summer term.


Staff may be able to offer additional video lessons each week, depending on their commitments with Year 10 face to face sessions, and students will receive email invites to these sessions where they are available.
